Top Teens of America History

In 1964, the eight founders of Top Ladies of Distinction (TLOD) Inc.'s primary objective was to help alleviate the moral and social problems engulfing the youth in our communities. This was done via a youth organization. In 1968, while meeting in Fort Worth, Texas, the membership of Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. decided that the group should have an official name. Lady Cordelia Mackey, President of the Texarkana Twin City Chapter, suggested the name of **Top Teens of America**. The name was adopted.

In 1969, there was a need to form a Top Teens of America group in each chapter of Top Ladies of Distinction. A committee was appointed and resultantly, the first National Top Teens of America convention was organized.

The Houston Chapter of Top Ladies and Top Teens hosted a meeting to organize the National Top Teens. Teen representatives from all Top Teens of America chapters were in attendance. Under the guidance of the first National Director of Top Teens of America, Lady Willie Lee Glass, the first National Convention of Top Teens of America was held in Houston, Texas in 1969. Over 300 Top Teens were in attendance.

Top Teen Harnell Price of the Rose City Chapter, Tyler, Texas, was elected as the first National TTA President. At this convention, the purposes of TTA were defined.

The TTA projects have expanded over the years to include:

- Participation in the NAACP
- Sickle Cell Disease Awareness
- Participation in the UNCF
- March of Dimes
- Participation in NCNW
- Mentoring Program/TLC
- Participation in the TLOD Literacy Program

In 1983, the TTA program was further expanded to include a collaborative project with the National Foundation March of Dimes. The program was known as Teens Outreach Program and Service (TOPS), a peer education program, designed to inform our teens about drugs, alcohol abuse, sexually transmitted disease and birth defects through workshops, seminars and conferences. Parents were encouraged to participate. TOPS through education has also enabled youth to make critical decisions regarding their lives.

In 1996, the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation and Top Ladies of Distinction, Inc. extended its youth peer education through a newly developed program known as Healthy Choices: Your Future and You. A TTA/MOD guide was written and circulated to all TLOD chapters to assist them with implementation of this health conference program. The major purpose of this program focuses on leadership development, critical decision making, adolescent health issues, and the support of Walk America.

The "Me and My Mentor" program was initiated in 1995. Every Top Lady was encouraged to personally touch the lives of Top Teens through one-on-one nurturing and the development of relationships that foster mutual trust and respect.

Since 1968, thousands of youth in secondary schools, nationally and internationally, have benefited from membership in Top Teens of America.


Teen Jadon Elmore

At times, there was a little bit of pain, but I knew it was all going to be worth it in the end because my brother would be able to live a pain free life.

I thank God for giving me the opportunity to do something special and to change my brother. Since the transplant, he feels great and can exercise; even running 10 or 12 miles at one time. He still goes to the doctor for his check-ups and he just had his 6month appointment. All is well!

character. He is open to new ideas and wants to serve his community.




Teen Brandon Hudson & Teen Trenton Lyke


Teen LaShayla Stephens

Teen Armani wants to be a Cardiologist and has






Teen Leilani Nichols





Financial Tips for Teens

1. Understand The Power Of Time

You probably aren't making a ton of money right now, but that doesn't matter. What matters is time. And your money has a lot of it. Let's look at an example: At the end of your summer job, you have \$1000. You invest it at a rate of return of 5%. You don't contribute another cent for 50 years. At the end of those 50 years, you will have \$11,467.49.Time is rarely on our side but it's on your side now if you start now.

2. Start A Money Saving Habit

How long have you been brushing your teeth? Because you have been doing it for so long, it's just a habit. The power of habit is almost as important as the power of time when it comes to money. If you start the habit of saving money now, that habit will always be with you. Establish a relationship with a bank now. In fifteen years when you want a loan to buy a house, a long track record with a bank can be helpful. You can get a debit card for the checking account. You can now spend money via your debit card rather than cash so you can easily track your spending.

4. Get Educated

You probably aren't getting much education about personal finance in school, maybe none at all. I have a whole conspiracy theory built around this. The more you know about money, the less you are tied to a job for decades making someone else money and the less consumer crap you buy. So you can see why it's in the interest of certain groups to keep you in the dark when it comes to handling money.

5. Make Smart Decisions About College

A smart decision about college can include the decision not to attend, or to delay attending for a few years and work full time to help pay for it.

A smart decision might be attending a local college for two years and then transferring to a more expensive, prestigious school. It means applying for every grant and scholarship you are evenly remotely qualified for. A smart decision is choosing to major in something that people actually get paid to do.

6. Establish A Credit History

Ideally, parents would help you start a credit history before you leave home. Handing an 18year-old their first credit card the day they get dropped off at college and telling them to "use it responsibly" and leaving it at that is a recipe for disaster. It's better if the process starts while you still live at home, and your decisions can be monitored. Speak to your parents about adding you as an authorized user to one of their credit cards.

They don't even have to give you access to the card but adding you to the account will open a credit file in your name. Once you have a credit file, get into the habit of checking your credit score.

7. Use Your Student ID

You can get so many discounts using your ID; Amazon Prime, tickets to museums, concerts, sporting events, restaurants, groceries, movies, train and bus travel, hotels, restaurants, newspaper and magazine subscriptions, clothing, electronics, shipping and lots more. Anytime you buy something, ask if there is a student discount.



We received donations to purchase extra items that were used to prepare the desserts and to add to the regular meals.

Ladies, Lords and TTA-Teens assisted in sorting, storing and with the preparation of meals that were delivered during the week. This collaborative effort supported 2020 senior citizens and disabled persons within the community with 1100 meals for a week.

Healthy Tips for Teens

PHYSICAL HEALTH

- 1. Exercise regularly. Teens should be physically active at least 60 minutes of every day.
- 2. Eat a healthy diet. Healthy eating is an important part of your growth and development. Eat plenty of fruits and vegetables, whole grains, a variety of protein foods, and low-fat dairy products.
- **3.** Get enough sleep. Most teens need between 9 and 9 ½ hours of sleep every night. Many average only 7 hours. Sleep has a strong effect on your ability to concentrate and do well at school.
- 4. Brush and floss your teeth. Make it a habit now, and prevent tooth and gum problems in adulthood.
- 5. Wear sunscreen. Getting just one bad sunburn as a child or teenager increases your risk of getting skin cancer as an adult.
- 6. Don't listen to loud music. This can damage your hearing for the rest of your life.

MENTAL HEALTH

- **1. Learn ways to manage stress.** You can't avoid stress, so you need to learn how to manage it. 25 minutes of meditation each day will decrease stress.
- 2. Study and do your best in school. There is a strong link between health and academic success.
- **3.** Try to maintain a good relationship with your parents. Remember that they want what is best for you.
- 4. Develop a good balance between school, work, and social life.

EMOTIONAL HEALTH

- 1. Know the signs of mental illness. These include: anxiety, depression, excessive tiredness, loss of self-esteem, loss of interest in things you used to like, loss of appetite, weight gain or loss
- 2. Pay attention to your moods and feelings. Don't assume your negative thoughts or feelings are just part of being a teenager. If you're worried about something, ask for help.
- 3. Don't be afraid to ask for help if you need it. If you can't talk to your parents, find an adult you can trust. If you're feeling really sad or are thinking about harming yourself, get help right away.
